## Healthy Tips for a Healthy Brain

- What is FGM/FGC? **Dr. S S Shani Asst. Professor, SoSS**

According to UNICEF (2024), Female genital mutilation (FGM)/Female Genital Cutting (FGC) refers to “all procedures involving partial or total removal of the female external genitalia or other injury to the female genital organs for non-medical reasons.”

WHO (World Health Organisation) classified FGM into four types (Ref: UNICEF Report 2024)

**Type I:** Partial or total removal of the clitoris and/or the prepuce.

**Type II:** Partial or total removal of the clitoris and labia minora, with or without excision of the labia majora.

**Type III:** Narrowing of the vaginal orifice by cutting and bringing together the labia minora and/or the labia majora to create a type of seal, with or without excision of the clitoris. In most instances, the cut edges of the labia are stitched together, referred to as ‘infibulation’.

**Type IV:** All other harmful procedures to the female genitalia for non-medical purposes, like pricking.

- Consume whole grain bread instead of white bread, and brown rice instead of white rice.
- Regular exercise and a balanced diet are vital for maintaining our physical and mental well-being.
- Consume the appropriate number of calories based on your age, gender, and physical activity level.
- A sip of water before taking a shower can help lower blood pressure.

- Avoid taking medications with cold water.
- Instead of ingesting fruit bars or fruit-flavoured snacks, try eating whole fruits such as oranges and apples.
- Reduce your salt and sugar intake.

- Avoid fruits with high carbohydrate and sugar content, such as grapes, cherries, and figs.

#### Instructions

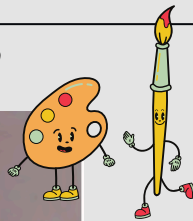
#### Ingredients:

- Ghee - 5 - tbsp
- Maida/Wheat - 4 - cup
- Oil - 1 litre - to fry
- Salt - 1 - pinch
- Sugar/jaggery - 2- cup

- Take a bowl, pour maida/wheat into it, add ghee and mix well. Now add water to make dough, the dough should not be too hard or soft. Take a wood groove plate - turn back side, then take a small piece of dough into hand and press at the backside of the fork and remove opposite direction repeat the same way for all the entire dough. Keep the shells to one side.

Now take a pan add oil to fry and add the shells into the oil. Deep fry it till the mixture turns light golden brown colour. Remember to fry in a low flame. Once it is done remove it from oil and keep it aside. Now take another pan, add sugar /jaggery and a little water. Let it boil till you get a thick consistency and then remove the pan from the flame. Add the fried shells to the sugar syrup and remove the shells to the serving plate once the sugar sticks to shells. Your SWEET IS READY!!!

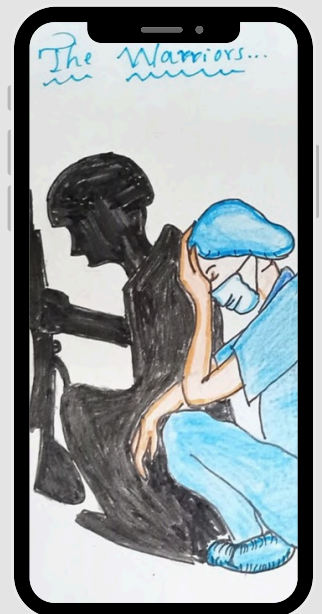
